

## New Books We Just Had to Read

Every month, the CCB Graduate Assistants highlight books reviewed in the most recent issue of the Bulletin that we were very excited to read. These decisions are based on personal preference, but all books listed are Recommended by the Bulletin. The goal is to introduce you to brand-new books. ### Ayanna's Choice:

**Berry, Julie.** *Secondhand Charm.* **Bloomsbury, 2010. 342p. ISBN 978-1-59990-511-2. \$16.99. Gr. 6-9.**

When news comes that the King is traveling to her village, Evie and everyone else start getting ready. Gypsies are invited to the festival and Evie finds herself taken by three necklaces peddled by a charms seller. Each charm is said to have special abilities: one for love, one for luck, and one for protection against a snake-bite. These charms come in handy through her ongoing adventure as she sets out to attend University on a scholarship bestowed upon her by the King. Evie also stumbles upon a very unlikely companion and must come to terms with who she really is and who she wants to be.

### Laurel's Choice:

**McBride, Lish.** *Hold Me Closer, Necromancer.* **Holt, 2010. 342p. ISBN 978-0-8050-9098-7. \$16.99. Gr. 8-12.**

Sam's mundane life as a college dropout working at a fast food restaurant is turned upside down when Douglas, a powerful necromancer, discovers that Sam also has the ability to raise the dead. Douglas gives Sam a week to decide whether to join him or suffer the consequences. Unfortunately for Sam, Douglas becomes impatient before the week is up. The suspense and horror throughout the book are nicely balanced by Sam's quick-witted humor. Fans of the supernatural are likely to appreciate the variety of other worldly characters present in McBride's first novel.

### Miriam's Choice:

**Goodman, Shawn.** *Something Like Hope.* **Delacorte, 2010. 208p. ISBN 978-0-375-89752-8. \$16.99. Gr. 7-10.**

Shavonne wants to avoid getting transferred from the Juvenile Detention Center to adult prison when she turns eighteen. But she has little reason to trust any adults to help her fulfill her wish; she has experienced abuse from her foster parents, phony sympathy from child psychologists, and manipulation by the detention center guards. When Shavonne meets Mr. Delpopolo, the shrink at the Juvenile Detention Center, she finds an adult who may help her break the cycle. Shavonne begins a struggle to learn how to trust herself and stop blaming herself for the violence she has experienced at the hands of adults. Author Shawn Goodman worked as a psychologist in a girls' detention center.

The CCB Graduate Assistants also put out a list of recommended holiday reading that we will be talking about at our next book club meeting. The list is also available on the CCB website. Here are some books that I would specially recommend; these are mostly YA books from the past year:

### For the fantasy lover:

*Bleeding Violet* is cool, twisted, and has a lot going on. The main character, Violet, lives with her mother in Portero, Texas. What happens, like hallucinations, is not so strange for her because she's manic-depressive. But as the reader, you have to sort out what is real and what is not.

### A little fun existentialism:

*Meanwhile* is a little like R.L. Stein's alternate ending *Goosebumps*, except there are way more endings. Sometimes you end up dead and sometimes you end up saving the world but it's different every time.

The Center for Children's Books (CCB) houses a non-circulating research collection of over 16,000 trade books for youth, birth through high school, and over 1,000 professional and reference books on the history and criticism of literature for youth, literature-based library and classroom programming, and storytelling. The collection includes prominent displays of Blue Ribbon Books (titles chosen by Bulletin reviewers as the best of the previous year's children's books), current award winners, books reviewed in the current issue of the Bulletin, and monthly thematic displays. The CCB also houses a growing collection of storytelling audio and video recordings.

We ensure all materials are available to patrons whenever the CCB is open - this means no materials leave the collection. Although the collection is non-circulating, it is available for examination by students, scholars, teachers, librarians, and other educators.

Our research collection emphasizes contemporary works, especially books from the last five to seven years, as well as titles of historical and critical significance.

The Center for Children's Books is located in Room 24 on the ground floor of the Graduate School of Library and Information Science (GSLIS) at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. GSLIS is located at 501 E. Daniel Street in Champaign.

Enter GSLIS through the building's main north entrance. Go up the stairs to your left (through an arched wooden doorway) and turn left. You will see another set of stairs. Go down to the lower level. Turn right to enter the Center.
